HCWA “Going Green” on March 17, for Fix a Leak Week

The HCWA will be “Going Green” on St. Patrick’s Day with a customer appreciation event during Fix a Leak Week, which is a national celebration that runs from March 16-22.

Come by the HCWA headquarters on Tuesday, March 17, from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., to enjoy refreshments and tips on how to find and fix water leaks, while also learning some effective water conservation ideas. We also will have free water efficiency kits for you to take

home, a WaterSense toilet giveaway, and a free spin on our prize wheel.

Our Leak Detection team will demonstrate how they locate leaks within our system, and our Finance Department will explain three-tiered pricing, to show how much a leak can cost and how much you can save during the year through water conservation.

Finally, we’ll have a sample residential meter (pictured left) to demonstrate how to check for leaks by monitoring water meter activity, in addition to looking for consumption spikes on your monthly bill, which could indicate a leak.



One of the many ways you can check for household leaks is by conducting a simple test with your water meter. To learn how, join us on March 17 when we “Go Green” during Fix a Leak Week.

Some Quick Fixes of Household Leaks

Fix a Leak Week gives us a chance to remind you of these inexpensive fixes that can prevent wasted water, thus saving you money!

- ✿ Toilet Leaks – usually from worn-out toilet flappers.
- ✿ Faucet Leaks – typically from old and worn washers and gaskets.
- ✿ Showerhead Leaks – usually fixed just by tightening the connection between the showerhead and the pipe stem.
- ✿ Outdoor Leaks – from damaged irrigation systems.
- ✿ In the Workplace – business property owners should check restrooms, kitchens, breakrooms, as well as outdoors.

Did you know that according to EPA figures, average household leaks can total nearly 10,000 gallons of water wasted per year?

The HCWA wrapped up another successful Hunting Season with four hunts spread over the Fall of 2019 and Winter of 2020.

The two Youth Deer Hunts and Veteran’s Hunt, to honor those who have served in the U.S. Military, were held at the HCWA Walnut Creek Land Application System (LAS) site, which includes more than 1,000 acres of protected green space. These hunts help the HCWA maintain proper land management and wildlife habitat, as

directed by the Georgia Department of Natural Resources.

The drawings for the annual HCWA Youth Hunts are held typically between June and August, so you can join the applicants who register for these free events at that time.

HCWA Fishing Season Kicking Off

Don’t forget that the regular HCWA Fishing Season kicks off the first week in March and continues through the end of November. During those months, the HCWA Tussahaw and Upper Towaliga Reservoirs will be open Wednesdays, Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays, from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., for citizens with an active Reservoir Use Permit.

Permits to access the HCWA reservoirs for fishing, boating (with electric or trolling motors only), canoeing or kayaking, are available at the Authority Headquarter, located at 1695 Highway 20 West in McDonough, for \$45. (Discounts are available for seniors and citizens with disabilities.) Permit holders must sign a release form and adhere to all rules and regulations governing the use of HCWA reservoirs and Georgia waters.

HCWA Reservoir Use Permits are good for the entire year from the date of purchase, and permit

holders can bring a guest with them for free. Currently, approximately 2,000 permits have been sold to those who qualify for access to HCWA reservoirs, which include HCWA customers, as well as Henry County residents and property owners.

Future Water Professionals Enrolled at SCTC

The partnership between the HCWA and Southern Crescent Technical College (SCTC) in support of the school's Water Quality Technology Program is bearing fruit.

Following an Open House at the SCTC Henry County campus on December 19, to recruit students for classes offered this Spring Semester, many are taking advantage of this opportunity to work toward Technical Certification to become water quality technicians.

The program courses include Occupational Safety & Health Regulations, Introduction to Water Treatment Processes, Wastewater Treatment, and Water Supply. Five of

the 14 students enrolled this semester are employed by the HCWA, with interest in receiving additional cross training for jobs in other aspects of the utility's water distribution and wastewater collection systems.

During the Open House, future students were able to tour the SCTC Henry County lab and classroom, meet the instructor, and learn more about a career in water quality and wastewater treatment operations.

U.S. Census 2020 is Critical to the Future of Henry County

Make Sure You're Counted!

Henry County citizens should be on the lookout this spring for information regarding the 2020 U.S. Census. Reminders will begin arriving to you during the month of March, with the official Census beginning in April.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 95% of household will receive their census invitation in the mail, while almost 5% will receive it by a census worker dropping it off at your home, and less than 1% will be counted in person. Every household will have the opportunity to respond online, by mail, or by phone.

It's critically important that citizens reply to their invitation to take part in the Census. By providing your household information as a Henry County resident, our community will receive its fair share of federal appropriations for years to come — that's your tax dollars coming back home for use in our community.

More than \$675 billion in federal funding flows back to states and local communities each year based on census data.

The U.S. Census also helps businesses make data-driven decisions, while providing utilities such as the HCWA with insights for better long-term capital planning, which will collectively impact the local economy. Your Census responses are safe and secure and completely confidential — no



personal information can be shared.

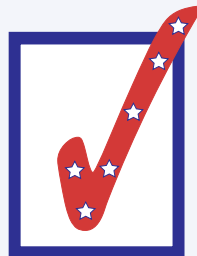

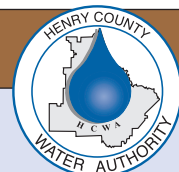
